The areas of wildflowers caused some consternation early on as it looked as though nothing was happening, but once the mown paths started to show it can now be seen taking shape. In early Autumn when the soil is softer, we will be planting bulbs along either side of the mown path from the seating area.

We are very pleased to see that the tree surgeon who worked on the Ash to take out the dead branches out leaving a stump, was correct in his advice that this was the best possible way of saving the tree as it is now sprouting leaves and looking very healthy as you can see from this photo... We look forward to seeing the Green in the Spring when the bulbs come up and hope that the wildflower areas will attract the insect, birds and bees to our green and that it will prove a good place to relax.

SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE

The Parish Council have now purchased and installed a second device. This is on Vespasian Road which we felt was a good spot as it reminds drivers as they enter the development that they should not be speeding. As with the first device, which is installed on Apollo Avenue heading down the slope to the school, the "Thank You" for not speeding sign is set to register up to 20mph in green and any speed over that "Slow Down" is in red.

We are working towards having the speed limit will on Fairfields lowered to 20mph from 30mph and on the adjacent page you will see a petition which will go to Milton In 2003 Edward and his wife moved to Spain due to his job. Our thanks to Jenny Burn for starting this series. Jenny has moved away from Fairfields so we will try to continue the series of understanding where our Roman road names come from. Laelia although a roman name is actually the Roman name given to a Spanish city inhabited for decades by the Romans.

Roman city of Laelia - Province of Seville, Spain Laelia was an ancient city located in the Cerro de la Cabeza near Olivares in the Province of Seville, Spain. The site of Cerro de la Cabeza de Olivares is one of the most unique heritage sites in the province of Seville. It was founded in the Late Bronze Age during the Tartessian period, it was named by Roman settlers in the 2nd Century BC as Laelia.

The city remained populated by the Romans without much change until the Christian conquest of the area in the 13th century when it became integrated with the city of Turdetan, following which it became an important commercial and productive city that even minted its own currency in the Republican era and developed a considerable population.

Laelia played an important role in the trade of metals obtained from the nearby Aznalcollar mines, as well as in the agricultural products of the rich plains of Aljarafe. The Guadiamar river, navigable at the time, served as a way of getting these products to the sea.

In the surroundings archaeologists have found numerous pottery remains, also the remains of a medieval hydraulic mill and the port area of the city. Its position, next to the Guadiamar Green Corridor, also makes it a place of great environmental
